- Call to Order, Flag Salute, Invocation, and Roll Call: The meeting of the San Gorgonio Pass Water Agency Board of Directors was called to order by Board President David Fenn at 1:30 p.m., November 20, 2017 in the Agency Boardroom at 1210 Beaumont Avenue, Beaumont, California. President Fenn led the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag. President Fenn led the invocation. A quorum was present.
- 2. Statement Regarding Teleconferencing: Teleconferencing was canceled.

3. Adoption and Adjustment of the Agenda: Director Thompson stated that the San Gorgonio Pass Regional Water Alliance will not be meeting on November 29th as listed under announcements. There were no other changes to the agenda.

4. Public Comment. President Fenn asked if there were any members of the public that wished to make a public comment that fall within the jurisdiction of the Agency that is not on today's Agenda. No members of the public commented.

5. Consent Calendar:

- A. Approval of the Minutes of the Regular Board Meeting, November 6, 2017
- B. Approval of the Minutes of the Engineering Workshop, November 13, 2017

Director Stephenson made a motion, seconded by Director Thompson, to approve the consent calendar as presented. Motion passed 6-0, with Director Lehtonen absent.

6. Reports:

A. General Manager's Report:

(1) Operations Report: (a) Deliveries: General Manager Davis reported to the Board that the Agency has delivered 940 acre-feet so far this month.

General Agency Updates: (a) SCWC: Southern California Water (2) Committee utilized the Agency's Board room for its Water Summit event that was held on Friday, November 17th; the event was well attended. Guest speakers were Supervisor Marion Ashley, Charlie Wilson (Executive Director SCWC), General Manager John Rossi (Western Municipal Water District), Jerry Johns (40 years in water industry - retired). General Manager Doug Headrick (SBVMWD) and General Manager Jeff Davis. (b) Groundwater Sustainability Plans: (1) Three grant proposals have been submitted; two for the San Gorgonio Pass sub-basin, and one for the Yucaipa sub-basin. (2) San Gorgonio Pass Integrated Regional Water Management Plan - two models (surface water and groundwater) have been melded together for the San Gorgonio Pass sub-basin, this is still in the calibration phase. (c) Bi-Annual Well Measuring: The Agency measures wells twice a year with the assistance of USGS. Fall well measurements took place last week. (d) DWR - Grant Davis: SWC met with Grant Davis last week. Grant Davis was appointed Director of the California Department of Water Resources by Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. in August 2017. Flexibility, working to get the California Water Fix built, and transfers and exchanges were discussed during the meeting. (e) Feather River Watershed: Up to 10-inches of rain was received last week in the Feather River watershed. (f) SWP Allocation: The initial allocation for 2018 is due by December 1st. The initial allocation may be low due to the water level at Lake Oroville and also Fall X2. Fall X2 is when water is released from Lake Oroville to bring down the salt level in the Delta. There is no scientific evidence that this action does anything for fish during the fall season. Due to Fall X2, the SWP lost 400,000 acre-feet of SWP water this year.

B. General Counsel Report: General Counsel Jeff Ferré stated that he submitted a written report that was included in the agenda packet. He asked if the Board had any questions. There being none, President Fenn continued on to Directors Reports.

C. Directors' Reports: (1) Director Duncan reported on the SCWC meeting that he attended on November 17. (2) Director Castaldo also reported on the SCWC meeting that he attended on November 17. (3) Director Thompson reported on the SGPWA Conservation and Education Committee meeting that took place on November 9. Topics of discussion included media and social media efforts, the purchase of groundwater models for local schools, and Inland Empire Resource Conservation District update on SGPWA's current school programs. IERCD was contracted to present 43 classes of which 18 have been completed thus far. IERCD has drafted a plan on how to execute the groundwater models to the schools. A proposal to an addendum to the contract between IERCD and SGPWA for the groundwater model presentations will be forthcoming for Board consideration. (4) Director Stephenson reported on the YVWD Board meeting that he attended on November 7th. (5) Director Ball reported that he will be providing to the Board a BCVWD PowerPoint presentation on SGPWA water supply portfolio, costs and funding strategies that was provided during its November 8th meeting.

7. New Business:

A. Consideration and Possible Action regarding Proposed Amendments to ACWA's Bylaws: Material provided by ACWA was included in the agenda packet. General Manager Davis stated that ACWA is conducting a membership meeting at the ACWA Fall Conference on Wednesday, November 29, 2017. ACWA is proposing several amendments to the bylaws; the amendments are listed in the material provided by ACWA. Votes are normally cast by members' Board Presidents via a proxy card. After discussion, the Board was in agreement in directing President Fenn to cast a vote approving the proposed changes to ACWA's bylaws.

B. Discussion and Possible Action Regarding Election of Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) President and Vice President: Material provided by ACWA and a letter of support from Steven LaMar were included in the agenda packet. ACWA is conducting a membership meeting at the ACWA Fall Conference on Wednesday, November 29, 2017. ACWA's Nominating Committee announced a 2018-2019 slate that recommends current Vice President Brent Hastey for ACWA President and current Federal Affairs Committee Chair Steven LaMar for ACWA Vice President. Nominations from the floor will be accepted prior to the vote. It was the consensus of the Board to designate President Fenn to vote on behalf of the SGPWA Board of Directors and permit him to determine if he will vote for the recommended slate, or otherwise.

Call to Order, Flag Salute and Roll Call: The Finance and Budget workshop of the San Gorgonio Pass Water Agency Board of Directors was called to order by Director Mike Thompson at 1:30 pm, November 27, 2017, in the Agency Board Room at 1210 Beaumont Avenue, Beaumont, California. Director Thompson led the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag. A quorum was present.
- 2. Adoption and Adjustment of Agenda: The agenda was adopted as published.
- 3. Public Comment: No members of the public requested to speak at this time.

4. New Business:

- A. Ratification of Paid Invoices and Monthly Payroll for October, 2017 by Reviewing Check History Reports in Detail: After review and discussion, a motion was made by Director Duncan, seconded by President Fenn, to recommend that the Board ratify paid monthly invoices of \$1,166,379.10 and payroll of \$36,996.64 for the month of October, 2017, for a combined total of \$1,203,375.74. The motion passed, 4 in favor, no opposed, with Directors Ball and Castaldo not yet present, and Director Stephenson absent.
- B. Review Pending Legal Invoices: After review and discussion, a motion was made by Director Lehtonen, seconded by Director Thompson, to recommend that the Board approve payment of the pending legal invoices for October, 2017. - E. Discussion of General Fund Monies Previously Used for SWP: General Manager Jeff Davis presented information from Agency records about expenditures made to build facilities to transport water from DWR's original point of delivery at Devil Canyon to the Agency's service area. The Agency and San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District shared the facilities and the cost of construction. Construction started in FY 1970-71 and continued through FY 1989-90. The total amount expended on the facilities from the General Fund was \$7,759,939. The Agency made payments to SBVMWD starting in FY1989-90 through FY2002-03. Payments from the Debt Service fund to SBVMWD totaled \$873.981. When the State Water Project decided to build the East Branch Extension, these facilities were included as part of the SWP. As a result, the Board authorized transfers of funds from the Debt Service Fund to "repay" the General Fund in August, 2004. A total for \$1,030,00 was transferred until October, 2010, when the Board suspended transfers until such time as further action was taken. It was the consensus of the Board that this matter be discussed and possible action taken at a future Board meeting with input from General Counsel.

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) is initially approving 631,115 acre-feet (AF) of Table A water for the long-term State Water Project (SWP) contractors in 2018. SWP supplies are projected to meet 15 percent of most SWP contractors' requests for Table A water, which totals 4,172,786 AF. Attached is the initial 2018 SWP allocation table.

This initial allocation is made consistent with the long-term water supply contracts and public policy. DWR's approval considered several factors including existing storage in SWP conservation reservoirs, SWP operational regulatory constraints, and the 2018 contractor demands. DWR may revise the initial and subsequent allocations if warranted by the year's developing hydrologic and water supply conditions.

DWR will use the current long-term SWP contractors' 15 percent schedules that they submitted in October 2017 as part of their initial request, unless contractors submit updated schedules. DWR will send the approved monthly water delivery schedules to the long-term SWP contractors.

Existing San Gorgonio – Whitewater River Water Conveyance: San Bernardino National Forest Permitting

Background:

- The **City of Banning** and the **Banning Heights Mutual Water Company (BHMWC)** depend on water from a flume system located partly in the San Bernardino National Forest that has delivered water since at least 1913
- The City and BHMWC own the water rights
- Much of the flume is within a Right of Way granted under the Act of March 3, 1891, granting perpetual property right subject to constitutional protections
- Hydroelectric power was added in 1923, regulated by Federal Energy Regulatory Commission
- In 1998 Southern California Edison elected not to relicense the system, but to repair it for continuing water delivery alone
- All repairs have been reviewed according to NEPA by Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in a Final Environmental Assessment
- When repairs are finished, the City will operate and maintain the system for water delivery only
- The City needs San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) Special Use Authorization for facilities and activities on National Forest lands
- The City's proposed project would not change existing flow at the stream diversions
- The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission seeks resolution among Forest Service, Southern California Edison, the City, and Banning Heights Mutual Water Company before it issues a license surrender order to SCE

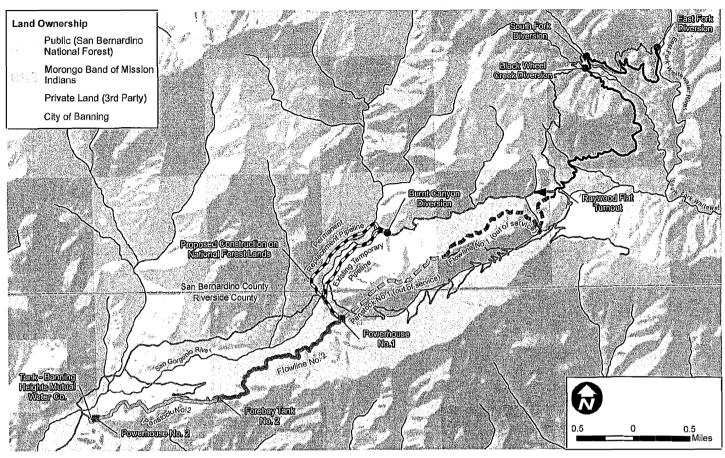
Where we stand:

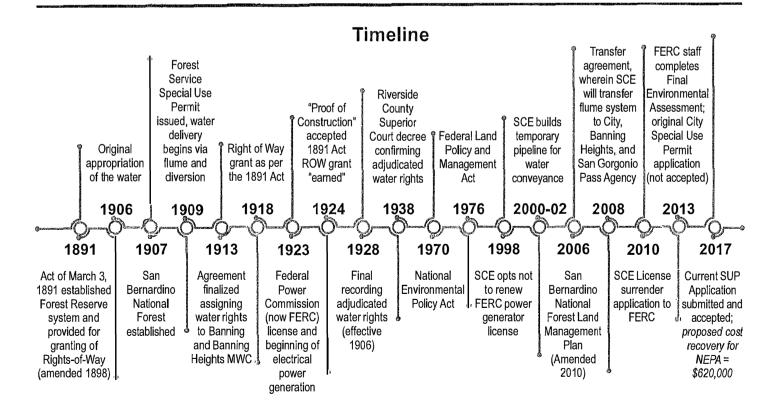
- The SBNF has issued a "Cost Share Agreement" to complete its National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) analysis, requiring the City to pay \$620,000
- The SBNF has indicated that additional "bypass" instream flow will be required for SUP authorization
- The SBNF believes that extensive analysis of stream habitat and flow conditions are needed, to evaluate the flume's effects on the natural stream channel
- The City and BHMWC are willing to discuss instream flows, but we question any conditions that would prioritize forest resources ahead of our rights and our communities' survival
- The City and BHMWC's position is:
 - the proposed cost is excessive
 - much of the field work and analysis are superfluous due to limited project impacts and limited regulatory authority
 - the Forest Service cannot regulate the Right of Way or the stream diversions that have been in operation since 1909

What we ask:

- We ask for collaborative partnership with the Forest Service to complete the NEPA analysis
- We ask the Forest Service to "right-size" the NEPA analysis, to cover only those topics where it has discretionary authority
- We ask the Forest Service to limit its future Permit Conditions to land use topics within its regulatory authority

Summary:

The purpose of this proposed Board action is to determine if the Board wishes to be a co-sponsor of the Southern California Water Committee's quarterly luncheon scheduled for January 19. The SCWC has asked four water agencies in the Inland Empire to be cosponsors at \$2000 each.

Background:

The Agency is a member of the Southern California Water Committee. The Committee was founded in the wake of the Peripheral Canal defeat in 1982 for the purpose of educating Southern California on issues relating to water, in particular on a through-Delta facility. Specifically, the Committee is a strong supporter of the Cal WaterFix. The Committee membership includes water agencies, counties, private business interests, and labor interests. It holds a quarterly luncheon with a speaker and an annual dinner. These events are held throughout Southern California. The January luncheon will be held in at the Victoria Club in Riverside.

Detailed Report:

At the Water Summit held in the Agency's boardroom on November 17, the Executive Director of the Southern California Water Committee, Charles Wilson, approached staff about the possibility of being a co-sponsor of the January 19 SCWC luncheon, to be held at a golf course in Riverside. He indicated that he was trying to split the burden of sponsorship among four members instead of having one entity sponsor it. The total minimum sponsorship required is \$8000; thus he has asked four water agencies to sponsor at \$2000 each. The San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District (Valley District), Western Municipal Water District of Riverside County, (Western), and the Inland Empire Utilities Agency have already agreed to sponsor; their logos are already on the SCWC website for this event.

Staff replied to Mr. Wilson that the Board would consider this request at its December 4 Board meeting. Earlier this year the Board decided to make all decisions regarding sponsorships, no matter how small, and indicated that it would prefer to sponsor only water-related events.

SCWC luncheons are typically well attended and their programs and speakers are typically excellent. Staff (and previous Board members) have attended many of these in the past. Staff has not attended any recent luncheons as their locations have not been conducive to attendance in the middle of the day.

The Water Summit held on November 17 was not only an outstanding event, but also represented an opportunity for the Agency to reconnect with the SCWC. The request to sponsor the event was an indication that the Committee values the Agency's input and participation and a recognition that the Agency's name associated with the event would be beneficial to the Committee. In addition, the Agency maintains its longstanding membership in the Committee.

Fiscal Impact:

Funds for the sponsorship would come from the "other conservation, education, and public relations" portion of the general fund budget. This line item includes \$35,000, of which none has been expended to date.

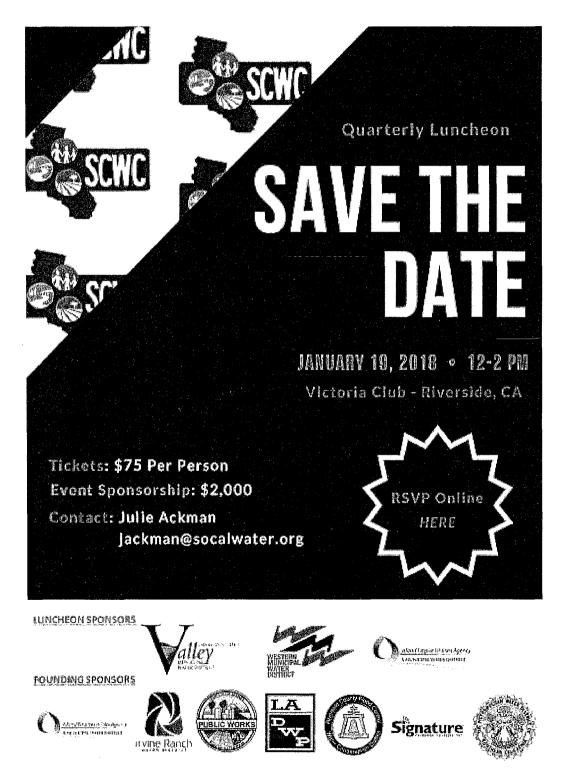
Recommendation:

Staff believes that a sponsorship of this event would raise the Agency's profile not only in the region but in all of Southern California (one of the objectives of the current strategic plan) and, since such sponsorships are envisioned in the budget, would not cause any financial hardship for the Agency. However, staff is not making a recommendation in light of the Board's direction to be the decision-maker for all sponsorships.

Summary:

A Board member has requested a discussion and possible action regarding advertising the Beaumont Avenue Recharge Facility for construction. In preparation for this discussion, staff has prepared a timeline of major events and Board actions related to this project. The timeline is presented below:

September 2011—Purchased the land for approximately \$3 million. June 2012—Contracted with consultants to produce an EIR and to prepare final design drawings.

December 2012—Held public scoping meeting for the EIR.

October 2013—Certified the EIR.

May-September 2014—Construction of pipeline portion of project. November 2015—Contracted with Albert A. Webb & Associates to complete contract documents in preparation for advertising for construction.

February 16, 2016—Board voted to postpone advertisement for 90 days.

May 2017—Board included "complete the recharge facility project" as a 2017 goal in the General Manager's evaluation.

June 5, 2017—Board directed staff to advertise project for construction.

October 26, 2017—Agency opened bids. Only two bids were received.

November 6, 2017—Board directed staff to reject both bids and to rebid the project.

November 21, 2017—Agency re-advertised project for construction. December 19, 2017—Sealed bids scheduled to be opened.
